Ryan Kennedy was an aspiring physicist and accomplished pianist when he first heard the organ at age 15, and was fascinated by the prospect of playing all his favorite music on a new and fascinating instrument. Two years and a lot of practicing later, he applied to Juilliard and was accepted as an organ major.

Since then, he's become an increasingly busy concert organist. Ryan has also become notorious for his programming—while his repertoire is, at its core, traditional, some very unusual selections find their way onto programs. A background in piano and opera accompaniment has manifested itself in the form of many transcriptions, not only of virtuosic piano repertoire like Ravel's Gaspard de la Nuit and Liszt's Sonata in B Minor, but also of orchestral music like Strauss' Alpine Symphony, Ives' Fourth Symphony, and a number of opera overtures and excerpts. Ryan has also specialized in the "single piece concert," where a full-length program is taken up by a single titanic work or a themed collection, such as Bach's Clavier Übung III, Duruflé's complete works, Reger's Chorale Fantasias, and multiple cycles by Messiaen. Finally, a vocal advocate for the role of improvisation in classical music, he has been known to perform improvisations in the styles of multiple composers, especially those who wrote little for the organ: a hypothetical concert may close with an imaginary Brahms or Mahler symphony. He is not yet brave enough to perform his own compositions, but that may change in the near future...

Ryan's recordings have been broadcast this past year on NPR (Bach), WQXR (more Bach), and BBC3 (Milton Babbitt's rarely-played Manifold Music). Competition credits include the American Guild of Organists' Regional Competition (winner), the Longwood Gardens International Organ Competition (semi-finalist), and the AGO's NYACOP (currently a semi-finalist). He has attained a Master's degree from The Juilliard School, studying with Paul Jacobs, and recently completed the doctoral program at Yale School of Music where he studied with Tom Murray.

About the Instrument

he Hauptwerk "Virtual Pipe Organ" was built entirely by the congregation of Greenwood United Methodist Church, led by Director of Music, Drew A. Worthen, over the span of three years. Completed and installed in the Spring of 2019, the organ has been a remarkable success and has become one of the most well-known and highly-regarded Hauptwerk organs in the world.

This organ has no pipes. Instead, the sounds you are hearing are actually hundreds of thousands of individual audio recordings (i.e. "samples") taken by recording each and every pipe, one by one, from organs all around the world. This allows you to experience an incredibly realistic digital clone of existing pipe organs from all nationalities, across all time periods. The organ contains virtual copies of some of the world's great organs, from builders such as Aristide Cavaillé-Coll, Gottfried Silberman, Ernest M. Skinner, Edmund Schulze, Henry "Father" Willis, and many more. The sounds you are hearing this evening are those of the Paramount 341 Composite Theatre Organ sample set from Paramount Organ Works, which derives its samples from several of the worlds great theatre pipe organs, and combines them into a single cohesive instrument.

In place of pipes, the organ instead has a massive audio system, containing 56 discrete audio channels, reaching a combined total of more than 20,000 watts of amplification power. This audio system, designed from the ground up for the sole purpose of recreating the demanding characteristics of pipe organ acoustics, was no small task. Like the pipe organs it emulates, this Hauptwerk organ can exceed both ends of the audible frequency range - playing from 16Hz to well over 20kHz, with an extreme dynamic range — from almost inaudible to window-rattling.
